Indiana Humanities agreed to AWLI's full request of \$1,925 for support of seven evenings in its "Calumet Revisited" speakers' series from November to next October. The series, cosponsored also by Calumet College of St. Joseph (CCSJ), focuses on the rich cultural and environmental history of the Calumet Region. These seven presentations will focus on history or other humanities-related aspects of this region's heritage.

Some of the upcoming presentations funded by this grant include a Nov. 7 presentation about the Southeast Chicago Historical Society by its executive director, Rod Sellers, and a Dec. 5 presentation of "Calumet College: 1970s Struggles and Beyond" by Walter Skiba, associate professor of arts and humanities. All presentations will begin at 5 p.m. in Room 265 of CCSJ.
